Volunteers, sponsoring agencies and funding partners work together to address the long-term effects of summer learning loss and subsequent achievement gap on students, their families and the community.

There are 250 kids attending five program sites from Santa Maria to Carpinteria for seven hours a day, five days a week. The results? Absolutely astounding — which is why this program is getting attention and financial support throughout the county. These kids are improving their reading skills two full grades in the seven-week program.
